ISD 196 GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

In order to graduate from any high school in District 196, students must meet the below general requirements:

Students must satisfactorily complete 66 credits of coursework at the high school level, grades 9-12 inclusively, to be eligible for high school graduation as specified below:

- English/Language Arts four years (12 credits);
- Social Studies four years (12 credits) encompassing U.S. History, Geography, World History, Government/ Citizenship and a .75 credit in Economics;
- Science three years (9 credits) including Biology and Chemistry or Physics;
- Mathematics three years (9 credits) encompassing Algebra, Geometry, and Statistics and Probability (as part of this requirement, students must earn 3 credits of Algebra 2 or its equivalent.);
- Arts one course from the Art Education or Music and Dance departments or Acting, Fashion Design Trends, Interior Design A, Marketing C, Advertising, Multimedia, or Advanced Multimedia;
- Wellness three courses (2.25 credits);
- Physical Education five courses (3.75 credits);
- Safety Education one course (.75 credit), and
- Other 16 credits, of which not more than 12 credits of Instrumental and/or Vocal Music may be applied toward fulfillment of the graduation requirements.

Career and College Readiness: Districts have a number of requirements to fulfill for students' career and college planning for students first enrolled in grade eight in 2012-13 and later. This includes offering students in grades 11 and 12 (who did not test as a grade 11 student during the school day) an opportunity to participate in a nationally recognized college entrance exam (ACT or SAT) on a school day.

EASTVIEW HIGH SCHOOL 9TH GRADE HONORS PROGRAMMING

SHOULD MY STUDENT REGISTER FOR HONORS OR ON-LEVEL COURSES?

Eastview has a comprehensive curriculum designed to prepare ALL students for post-high school experiences. Both on-level and honors level courses provide a college prep experience.

- Approximately 90% of all EVHS students go on to a post-high school education.
- Approximately 40% of all EVHS students take honors courses.
- Approximately 50% of all EVHS students go on to a post-high school education without taking honors classes.

INTERESTED IN HONORS?

Consider the following:

- ✓ Passion for learning at high levels, interest in subject area(s) and curiosity for learning new things and solving problems
- ✓ Ability to work independently, without a need for additional support or tutoring
- ✓ Self-awareness and willingness to seek help when necessary
- ✓ Commitment to putting in the additional time an effort needed to be successful
- ✓ Level of proficiency on MCA Math and Reading scores (E/exceed is where most of our honors students achieve)
- ✓ Current grades/GPA (A-B grades typically transfer to higher likelihood of success in high school honors)
- ✓ Other factors such as co-curricular and community involvement, motivation, preparation, skills and habits

DO YOU HAVE TIME TO COMMIT TO HONORS COURSES? HOW MANY HONORS COURSES SHOULD YOU TAKE?

Honors courses at EVHS incorporate higher level thinking skills including analysis, evaluation and synthesis of ideas. This intensive approach allows for the increased pacing of the course while allowing time for a broader application of other disciplines within the courses i.e., more math applications in science courses or more writing and reading in social studies. These higher levels of cognition may require more processing time for students resulting in a greater time commitment for work to be completed outside of class. On average about 30-45 minutes each day is an expectation for studying the curriculum outside of class. To help you determine if you have the time to commit to honors programming, use the question prompts below to determine your time commitments as one determining factor of your ability to maintain the required pacing within honors courses.

- Do you plan to participate in co-curricular activities (sports, fine arts)?
- Do you volunteer for any organizations? How many hours do you commit to your service?
- Are you employed? How many hours/days per week do you work?
- What family commitments do you have (helping younger siblings, driving family members to events, family meals and/or family time, etc.)?
- Do you have any other activities or commitments that conflict with focused study time, like church, clubs or organizations outside of school?
- Do you plan to supplement your study time with a study hall during your school day?

Examine your current time commitments and then determine the remaining time available for school work, relaxation and sleep. This reflection on your commitments should be used as a guide to determine your opportunity for success.

HONORS DESIGNATION AT GRADUATION

Toward encouraging students at Eastview High School to take the most challenging courses they are capable of taking, we incorporate an honors recognition program. To qualify for Honors Recognition at Eastview High School, students must meet the following criteria:

- Take at least thirty-two (32) quarter courses of EVHS Honors/AP Core Classes throughout grades 9-12. This must include eight (8) quarter courses in each of the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grade years. PSEO classes taken outside of EVHS do not count toward this EVHS honors recognition.
- Students must earn a grade of "C" or better for an Honors/AP class to count toward the total/grade-level minimums. (For the purpose of determining honors recognition a "P" grade is considered lower than a "C" grade and, as such disqualifies the course for honors recognition.)

Eastview High School: Class of 2025 Freshman Registration Worksheet

The school year at Eastview is divided into four nine-week quarters, with seven periods per day. Students have the opportunity to *select up to 28 quarter courses* during the registration process (*4 quarters x 7 periods per quarter = 28 courses*). Each quarter course earns .75 credit (so successful completion of a year-long course earns .75 x 4 = 3 credits toward graduation). Ninth grade students must select a minimum of 24 courses; study halls will be assigned for remaining open periods. Actual placement of courses (including study halls) will be determined during the scheduling process.

Use the worksheet below to guide your selection process. Full-year required core courses (English, Social Studies, Mathematics and Science) are listed first; choose one sequence in each category and select all four quarter courses (A/B/C/D) to meet the full-year requirement. Required PE/Wellness/Safety Ed courses are listed next. Elective choices follow, with full-year courses first (World Languages, Choir and Band), and quarter electives at the end. Courses with prerequisites and other recommendations are identified with an "*"; complete descriptions and additional details can be found online at evhs.district196.org/academics/registration.
